

Internationally CARE is one of the largest humanitarian organisations. In 2015 CARE International supported more than 65 million people in 95 countries. CARE Danmark focuses on long-term projects in nine countries.

We support poor families and help them to provide food and to work their way out of poverty. The poor farmers in developing countries are often the most vulnerable to climate change. It has become even more difficult for farmers to provide enough food for themselves and their families. Together with local organisations, CARE Danmark support vulnerable farmers in developing countries. The goal is to empower poor farmers through education and knowledge sharing on how to deal with the challenges they meet. CARE Danmark focuses on helping people to help themselves, because it saves lives, money and reduces suffering.

CARE Danmark brings our work into action before disasters strike in order to create long-lasting solutions together with poor and vulnerable families.



## **BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S REPORT 2015**

Throughout 2015, CARE Danmark has been working on three major topics: climate change, the historic cuts in danish development aid and Nepal.

In 2015 CARE Danmark has actively participated in political debate advocating for millions of people in developing countries, most affected by climate change. As part of this work. CARÉ Danmark has been successful in engaging more than 12,000 Danes in a national petition, which demanded political action and securing an ambitious climate agreement with special attention on the world's poorest. CARE Danmark's political work in the run up and during the climate summit in Paris resulted in great publicity and we were able to influence politicians and organisations before and during the climate summit.

CARE Danmark successfully linked the climate change agenda with long-term development efforts and the current refugee situation. This argument was supported by a great conference held at the Danish Parliament in October, where politicians, participants and the press were invited to learn and discuss climate refugees.

The year of 2015 will be remembered as the year when the government launched a historic cut on development assistance. The reduction accounted for 25 per cent of the funds organisations receive to do development work from the government as part of a framework agreement.

"It's a black day for the good and recognized development work that Danish organisations like CARE Danmark performs in poor countries." National Director of CARE Danmark. Niels Tofte, wrote as input to the discussion around the new national annual budget of 2016. CARE Danmark's budget was cut annually with 10 million Danish kroner as part of the framework agreement.

The close cooperation with DANIDA continued in 2015. At the same time, CARE Danmark's work continued to focus on other donors than DANIDA. CARE Danmark was successfully chosen to carry out a number of projects for EU – also the UK governmental aid agency. DFID, extended their support to CARE Danmark's African climate change adaptation project, ALP.

The effort to make CARE Danmark less dependent on funds from the Danish Government appeared to be a strategically wise choice especially after the change of government in 2015.

In this context it is also important to thank the many people who support CARE Danmark through contributions or memberships, which are a prerequisite for our work.

Finally, Nepal played a prominent role in CARE Danmark's activities. On 25th of April, the

most devastating earthquake in more than 80 years hit the country. Over 600,000 homes were destroyed and 9,000 Nepalis lost their lives.

"It is the most frightening thing, I have ever experienced. You are left completely powerless," CARE Danmark's resident advisor, Søren Engberg Jensen, expressed after the earthquake. Quite extraordinarily, CARE Danmark participated in the humanitarian relief work.

Nepal also played a central part of CARE Danmark's work in 2015, as the profit from the Danish Broadcasting Corporation's Christmas Calendar Project 2015 (Børnenes U-landskalender) went to CARE Danmark's project *The forgotten children of the Himalayas* (Himalayas glemte børn). In addition to the DR TV-programs from Nepal, CARE Danmark had storytellers visiting schools reaching 17,000 children throughout the country.

His Royal Highness Prince Joachim together with the music artist Per Vers and the DR Ultra-host Joakim Ingversen presented the Christmas Calendar of 2015. The launch and the 170 school lectures led to a massive press coverage of CARE Danmark.

In 2015 CARE Danmark has invested many resources in establishing partnerships with Danish foundations and companies. We have initiated a cooperation with Bestseller Foundation on a project to create jobs and increase income for young people in Kenya. At the same time, CARE Danmark continues to work with Coop and Arla to develop sustainable business models and partnerships in Africa.

In the light of the government's significant reduction and reform of a long-term focus on development and poverty reduction, we will state that in the future, it is even more necessary to position CARE Danmark as an

organisation, which naturally cooperates and pursues dialogue with business organisations and companies. Just as it is necessary to continue looking for new funding opportunities in forms of partnerships and foreign donors.

The cooperation with companies and foundations must and can be done without ever giving up the focus, which is essential to CARE Danmark: To empower poor people in developing countries and to support them to create better lives for themselves.

In 2015, CARE Danmark had a turnover of 128 million kroner. It is the highest turnover since CARE Danmark was established in 1987. The financial results of 2015 shows a positive outcome at 1.1 million and the unrestricted reserves stood at 12.9 million. Despite cuts in public funding and a competitive funding market, we have managed to achieve a satisfying result.

# FINANCIAL REVIEW 2015

In 2015, CARE Danmark had a turnover of 128 million kroner. That is the biggest turnover since CARE Danmark was established in 1987. Of this, 48 million kroner came from CARE Danmark's framework agreement with DANIDA. Additionally, CARE Danmark received project support from the EU and from the governments of Great Britain and Austria. Last, but not least, CARE Danmark received significant contributions from individuals, companies and foundations.

#### **FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES**

In 2015, CARE Danmark raised a total of 22.5 million kroner from private donors, businesses and foundations, altogether representing 18 per cent of the total revenue. The total revenue from private donors, businesses and foundations is below the 2014-level, primarily because CARE Danmark received a large inheritage in 2014.

This year, the majority of private fundraising came from contributors and members who support on a monthly basis. This amounted to 16.1 million kroner — of which 4.4 million kroner came from memberships. The number of support members in CARE Danmark has increased from 13,745 in 2014 to 15,737 in 2015. The number of contributors decreased from 24,831 in 2014 to 23,858 in 2015. This is primarily because CARE Danmark in 2015 prioritised to recruit new support members more than recruiting new contributors.

CARE Danmark's cooperation with businesses was continuing in 2015 as a considerable part of CARE Danmark's fundraising strategy. CARE Danmark's strategic partnership with Coop 'Kilimo Biashara' continued in Kenya in 2015. Additionally, a partnership concerning the

Charity Button on the bottle refund machines in Coop's supermarkets extended with four months into 2015.


In 2015, CARE Danmark also took part in the yearly Danish National Telethon (Danmarks Indsamling) in which 100 million kroner was raised for humanitarian projects in developing countries. CARE Danmark's share of the amount was 3.5 million kroner. The money is earmarked for a project in Ghana that fights against violations of rights in relation to mining activities.


#### **ANNUAL RESULT AND 2016 FORECASTS**

The final account for 2015 shows an overall surplus of 1.1 million kroner. As of December 31st, 2015, unrestricted reserves amounted to 12.9 million kroner. The result is satisfying in the light of CARE Danmark's long-term goal of building its own capital.

The administrative expense ratio in relation to total revenue has gone down from 12% in 2014 to 11% in 2015. This is due to an increase in revenue from public institutions. We expect that revenues from public institutions will be slightly lower in 2016 than in 2015.

In 2016, CARE Danmark expects a negative result of a total of 228,000 kroner. The framework grant from DANIDA was in 2015 48 million kroner, but after the government's historic cutbacks in development assistance, the framework grant has been reduced to 38.4 million kroner in 2016. In comparison, the well-established cooperation with the EU and other foreign institutional donors is expected to continue in 2016.




#### **CARE DANMARK**
